Welcoming the Rev. Audra Abt

It is my great pleasure to welcome the Rev. Audra Abt to St. Andrew's. On July 1st Audra began work as the Assistant to the Rector for Children's Ministries. Audra will work with the Children's Support Team, with parents, and with volunteers to create offerings for children and their families that are both formative and fun. Audra will also join me and the Rev. Bob Hamilton in the Sunday morning clergy rotation, offering her gifts as a preacher and celebrant on a regular basis.



Audra brings the energy and ideas of a newly-ordained priest, as well as the wisdom and experience of someone who's been at this for a long time. She is a great listener and a great "coach," and she excels at bringing the gifts of a community to bear on a particular challenge or need. Audra brings a wealth of experience to our staff: she has worked in kindergarten and first-grade classes, she is proficient in Spanish, and she currently serves the Diocese of North Carolina as a coordinator of a grants project. Audra is with us 1/4 time and will therefore need your support and participation in order to help our vision for children's ministry come to fruition.

I believe that a children's ministry that reflects the needs of the church and the community is essential to the health and well-being to the whole parish. When I was hired to be your rector, I heard loud and clear from St. Andrew's that this church shares this belief and desires to make our parish a place where children are visible and valued, and where parents are supported in raising their children in the faith. I have placed a great deal of emphasis on this in my first nine months here, and will continue to do so. However, one of the great benefits of Audra's presence among us is that, while I will continue to work closely with her, her leadership will allow me to focus on other areas of ministry that are equally vital.

It is important also to let you know that Audra's position with St. Andrew's is largely funded through a 2-year gift from the Diocese of North Carolina. Audra is at the beginning of her ordained ministry, and Bishop Curry believes that St. Andrew's will be an excellent place for her to serve and to learn. I believe that she has remarkable gifts for ministry and that St. Andrew's will benefit greatly from her presence among us. Bishop Curry and I are very excited about Audra, and we all hope that St. Andrew's will grow in participation and giving to the point that we will be able to support this position on our own. In the coming months and years, I ask for your support and prayers as Audra begins her journey with us.

Children's Ministry

This past May, past and present leaders of St. Andrew's ministry with children, parents, and our congregation's youngest members, all gathered for a two-day retreat. We enjoyed food and fellowship, and we spent time envisioning how we as a congregation can best support and lift up our children in their Christian spiritual journeys. Over the course of the retreat, we identified several things that are important to us and that we want to see our Children's Formation program be about:

- Service (engaging long- and short-term projects that will connect children with both their wider community and with other members of St. Andrew's),
- Giving children a biblical foundation that they can begin to appropriate and tell the stories of faith for themselves,
- Integrating a spiritual life at home and supporting families in this life,
- Learning to be a community where we struggle together and actively share our faith, and
- Offering a variety of musical and kinesthetic learning opportunities while setting what we do to the rhythms and rituals of the liturgical year.

As we look ahead to the fall and our Sunday morning 9:30-10:15am Formation and Children's Chapel times, the Children's Support Team is taking what we envisioned during our May retreat and creating something new while using many of the great resources and ideas we've had in the past. I am very excited to see the energy and creativity surrounding this ministry and look forward to this coming year working with all of you for the sake of our youngest members.



Taizé

In our busy lives, it can be difficult to create a space not only on our calendars, but within ourselves, to enter into quiet prayer. But when we are able to sit in quiet readiness, making ourselves wholly available to the Holy One, we find that deep relationship with the divine is more possible than our hectic lives might suggest.

In June, several faith communities came together in an ecumenical gathering to worship in the spirit of Taizé.

Taizé is a monastic worshipping community in France who welcome pilgrims from around the world into their life of prayer, reflection, and service of witness for justice and peace in the world. Here in Greensboro, people of faith have been hungering for a place to gather for worship that crosses denominational boundaries and provides a time of contemplative prayer in the midst of a verbose and fast-paced world.

Imagine people seated- in chairs or cross-legged on pillows- before the cross and an icon of the Trinity. At sunset after a long day, the room is lit by the warm light of candles, and the assembly enters into prayer through alternating periods of deep silence and simple songs chanted meditatively. I have been deeply moved by my participation in these times of gathering for worship and prayer, and I want to invite anyone interested in learning more to contact me with questions, and all are welcome to participate in upcoming worship services in the spirit of Taizé.

This fall, the services will be held on the first Thursday of every month at All Saints Episcopal Church, located at 4211 Wayne Rd. Silence will be observed beginning at 6:45pm, and the service will begin at 7pm, lasting until around 8pm.

“Singing is one of the most essential elements of worship. Short songs, repeated again and again, give it a meditative character. Using just a few words they express a basic reality of faith, quickly grasped by the mind. As the words are sung over many times, this reality gradually penetrates the whole being. Meditative singing thus becomes a way of listening to God. It allows everyone to take part in a time of prayer together and to remain together in attentive waiting on God, without having to fix the length of time too exactly.

To open the gates of trust in God, nothing can replace the beauty of human voices united in song. This beauty can give us a glimpse of "heaven's joy on earth," as Eastern Christians put it. And an inner life begins to blossom within us.

These songs also sustain personal prayer. Through them, little by little, our being finds an inner unity in God. They can continue in the silence of our hearts when we are at work, speaking with others or resting. In this way prayer and daily life are united. They allow us to keep on praying even when we are unaware of it, in the silence of our hearts.” – from Taizé brothers' reflections on prayer through song

Alcohol Use Policy

This spring, the Vestry spent some time considering how we might appropriately offer alcoholic beverages during certain special events. We strive to be a place of warm hospitality, and want our fellowship to be an expression of that. But at the same time we recognize the dangers of irresponsible use of alcohol, even in the context of a church social event. We know also that there are members of the St. Andrew's community who struggle with alcohol use, either for themselves or loved ones. Any alcohol use policy must keep them in mind as well, so that *all* may truly feel welcome, at all times, within these walls.

To that end, the Vestry has carefully and prayerfully crafted an alcohol use policy and permission form that permits the moderate use of alcohol with prior approval from the Wardens and the Rector.

The essence of true hospitality is the attention we pay to every detail that goes into an event, so that all may feel welcome and included. Likewise, the new alcohol use policy calls for us to pay attention to every detail: from prior planning to make sure those beverages are served in a manner that encourages moderation and responsibility, to offering equally attractive non-alcoholic options. It is in our attention to these and other details that St. Andrew's will continue to be a place of welcome and hospitality.

St. Andrew's Policy Serving and Use of Alcoholic Beverages May 2011

St. Andrew's Church allows the use of alcoholic beverages for adults at church-sponsored activities and events held on the campus of St. Andrew's under certain conditions and with prior approval. At all events and activities where alcohol is offered, moderate usage is expected, and the following policies and procedures must be adhered to on St. Andrew's property:

The serving of alcoholic beverages at church events will be limited to wine, beer, and champagne.

Permission to serve alcoholic beverages at each event must be granted in writing by the Rector and Senior and Junior Wardens. The attached permission form must be signed and on file in the church office. For regularly occurring events such as EfM or Men's Study Group, one signed permission form is sufficient for each calendar year.

All applicable federal, state, and local statutes and ordinances must be obeyed, including those governing serving to and use of alcoholic beverages by minors.

When alcoholic beverages are served, non-alcoholic beverages and food must also be served with equal attractiveness and accessibility. Alcoholic beverages should be served in such a way as to encourage moderate usage.

The serving of alcoholic beverages at church events should not be advertised as an attraction of the event.

Alcoholic beverages and drinks cannot be sold, and a charge cannot be assessed for the consumption of alcoholic beverages. However, donations will be accepted to defray the costs incurred for the event at which they are served.

The group or organization sponsoring the activity or event at which alcoholic beverages are served is responsible for complying with this policy and all other building and grounds policies.

Alternative transportation should be offered and made available at all events where alcoholic beverages are served.

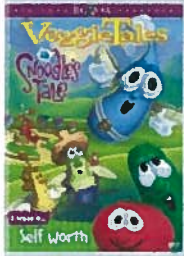

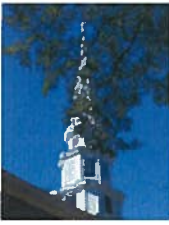
